Niemic repeats as State Champion for American Legion National Oratorical Contest

AUGUSTA, ME. February 17, 2006 --- Old Town High School Junior wins statewide American Legion Oratorical Contest. Contestants, family, friends and Legionaries traveled from all corners of Maine for the American Legion Oratorical Contest. Sarah Niemic's Oration titled "If Not You Then Who" captivated the audience in the auditorium of the Maine Veterans Home. She placed first and received \$1000, an American Legion Medal and an expense paid

trip to compete in the National Contest at Purdue/Indiana University Conference Center in Indianapolis, IL. Grace McKenzie, a junior at Cape Elizabeth, was the runner up and received \$750 and a Legion Medal. Andrea Wrede, a junior at Lisbon Falls, placed third and received \$500 and a Legion Medal. Niemic as a Penquis Valley High School sophomore won the state contest in 2005 and competed at the National contest in Indianapolis, IL. The contestants had competed and won at the Local High School / Post, County and District levels before the statewide competition. Niemic won \$450 in route to the State Championship winning at American Legion Contests at: Post # 41 in Milo; Piscataquis County; and 5th District. The judges at each level are civic and academic leaders. Sarah Niemic, accompanied by her mother Donna Niemic, will travel to Indianapolis, as guests of the American Legion, to compete in the American Legion Sponsored National High School Oratorical Contest.

The National High School Oratorical Contest, sponsored since 1938 by the American Legion, is designed to instill a greater knowledge and appreciation of the Constitution of the United States in high school students. Other objectives include the development of leadership, the ability to think and speak clearly and the preparation for the acceptance of the duties, responsibilities, rights and privileges of American citizenship. Each contestant must give a prepared oration on some phase of the United States Constitution, giving emphasis to the duties and obligations of a citizen to his/her government. Contests are open to all High School Students.

Each State winner who competes in the first round of the National Contest will receive a \$1,500 scholarship. Participants in the second round who do not advance to the National Final round will receive an additional \$1,500 scholarship. The top three youth orators who have won all previous elimination rounds of the contest will vie for top honors in the National Contest on April 9-10, 2005, at the IUPUI Conference Center and Hotel, Indianapolis, IN. In addition to the awards by winners of the various elimination rounds of competition, university scholarships of \$18,000, \$16,000, and \$14,000 will be awarded to the first through third places in the National Finals. The American Legion pays the expenses for contestants and one chaperon or coach per contestant.

Bill Sawtell arranged for us to receive this letter from Jeremy Webb. Jeremy is the son of Suzy and Rex.

Since arriving here in August we have been extremely busy every day. Supplies and people need to be moved and we are the ones that make that possible. We do this by constantly occupying the roads in patrols to find what the IED's (bombs) that the enemy is places along the road to hurt us. Also we provide security for the movement of all multi national force assets and for VIP movement. As many people have heard back home, this is a pretty dangerous job. I work with some of the most courageous and brave people that America has to offer. The enemy has been successful in their attacks many times, but we have taken care of our men and only a handful have been severely hurt.

My unit has lost 2 people so far and we've sent 4 home to be treated by specialists. The support and prayers that we have received from my home are pretty amazing. My men think that I come from a really great place. We can definitely feel the prayers surrounding us in the countless close-calls that we've seen and I've definitely seen personally. I thank God that my injuries in the three explosions I've been in myself have been minimal and dozens more of my men have been in blasts and are still here working with me today. The reality of our job here is unsettling, but we like to joke about it and call ourselves

human mine sweepers. ☺ Lucky for us we became good at this job very quickly (not that we had any choice in the matter!).

As our time here is winding down we find it very hard to stay focused on what still lies ahead here. That's just while we're inside the wire. When it is time to go to work we do not fool around. This experience has opened my eyes on this corner of the world, I'm not sure what I think of it yet, but at least I've seen it and lived it. I am anxious to put this behind me and go home to my beautiful new wife and meet my baby boy!

I couldn't even tell you what it is, but let me tell you it is the softest pink cloud of cloth that I've ever felt. It also shed little pink fibers everywhere we went. What a mess. It will be a nice gift to take home with her. Morgan loves to watch Animal Planet Network. She hopes to be a veterinarian. With all my heart I hope that their career goals can be met...somehow. They are three different personalities with dozens of different likes and dislikes...but all adorable, loving, giggling, family oriented little beauties. The best part....they're mine...oh yes, and Bup's, too. Can't forget Bup.

Here is the recipe that Hayley will use to make the bread:

Nannie's Lemon Poppy Seed Bread

Mix these dry ingredients in a big bowl.

2-1/4 cups flour
2/3 cup sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. ground nutmeg
3 Tbs. poppy seeds

In another bowl whisk:

1 large egg
1/4 cup cooking oil
1-1/4 cups cold water
2 Tbs. lemon juice
zest of 1 lemon

Add the liquid mixture to the dry ingredients. Stir just until blended. Do not over mix. Spread in a greased and floured 8"X 4" loaf pan and bake for 55 minutes in a 350 degree oven.

When it's almost time for the bread to come out of the oven put together these ingredients for syrup.

1/4 cup sugar
3 Tbs. lemon juice

Heat on the stove or in a microwave until the sugar dissolves.

Remove the bread from the oven and set it (in the pan) on a cooling rack. In a minute or two poke holes about an inch apart in the bread with a skewer. Pour the syrup over the bread

and let it remain in the pan for about 20 minutes while it sets up a little. Finally, turn the bread out of the pan onto a cooling rack to finish cooling.
